What prompted you to learn Tok Pisin initially?

Thibaut: Given my current role which involves a lot of interaction with civil society members, being able to speak Tok Pisin, understand a few words and initiate a discussion in the language is very beneficial. The idea is to build trust and a relationship with them. The fact they see that I've made the effort to learn the language could plays an important role.

Sue: My initial goal was to acquire a basic understanding of Tok Pisin, and the course certainly fulfilled that objective. Overall, I found the course to be highly beneficial. My primary aim was to effectively communicate with the locals. Fortunately, working alongside the local constabulary provided practical opportunities for practice and correction. I also get the opportunity to practice Tok Pisin when I go shopping or go to the market.

How would you assess the overall quality of our course?

Thibaut: The instructors are very enthusiastic. The introduction to Tok Pisin is particularly useful for gaining fluency. I've also found the exercises I can do outside class to be beneficial, an effective approach to making progress. Even though the course is over, I continue to speak frequently with my colleagues and in my daily life, which helps to maintain and even improve my level of Tok Pisin.

Sue: For an online course, I was impressed with the exceptional performance of the two instructors. I found it to be excellent, and I must commend the instructors for their patience and their ability to adapt to the group's pace. I would wholeheartedly recommend this course.

What aspects of the course did you find particularly appealing?

Thibaut: Another advantage, beyond the simple ability to communicate, lies in the multitude of cultural aspects that shine through the language. This allows me to deepen my understanding of the local culture. The fact that expatriates make the effort to learn the language is well received. It's a way of showing respect for the local culture and facilitating integration.
